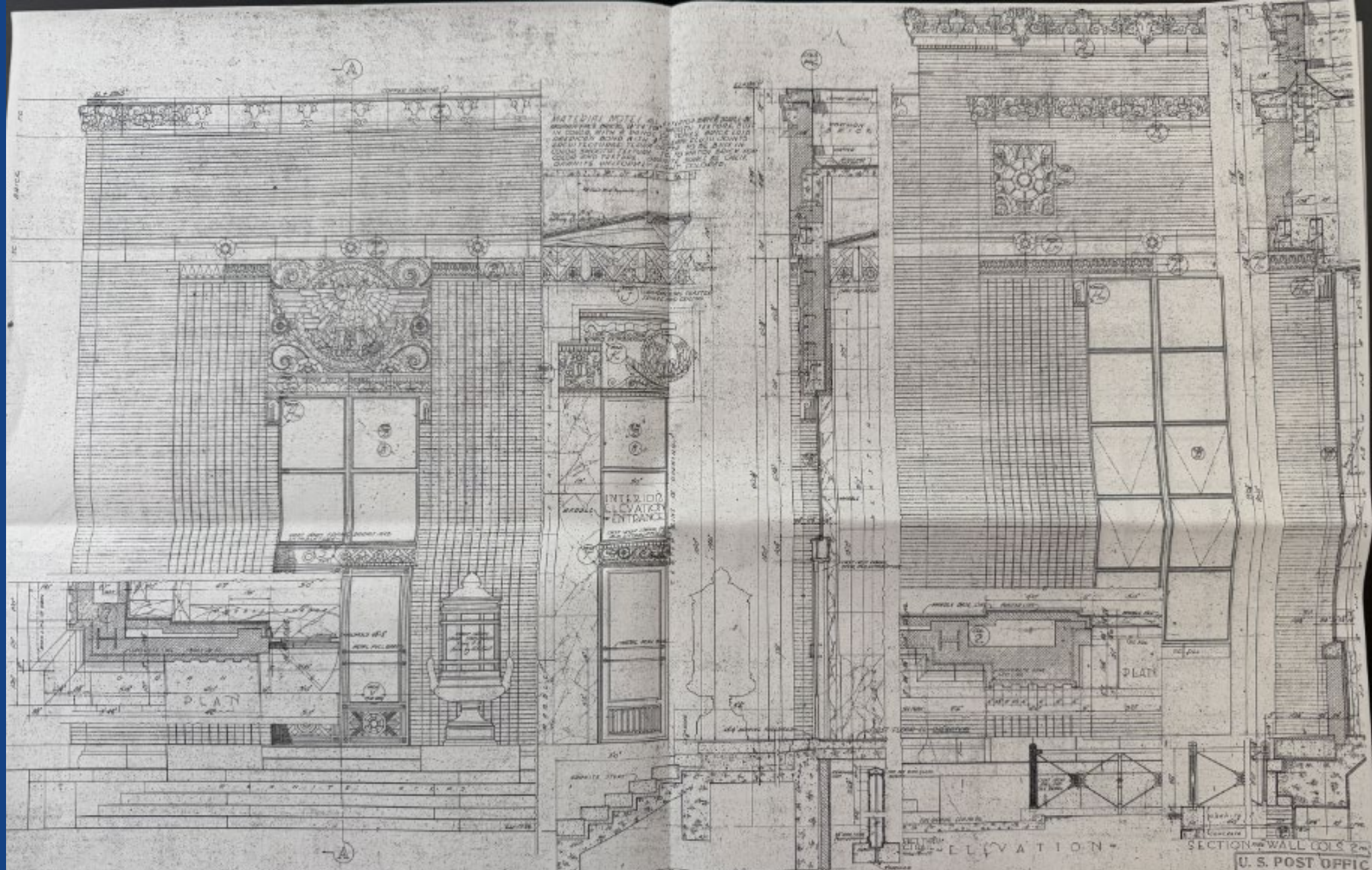
W.H. Corlett (1856-1937) designed the Alexandria Hotel and Annex, the Migliavacca House, the Noyes Mansion, the St. Helena Carnegie Library, and the Napa County Courthouse Plaza. He worked as supervising architect on the Napa Post Office Project.

Walter Dickson Reed (1878-1933). Born in Alameda, graduated from MIT in architecture.

The firm received \$5760 compensation for the design.

 THREE QUARTER INCH SCALE DETAILS OF EXTERIOR, COLS 1 AND 2

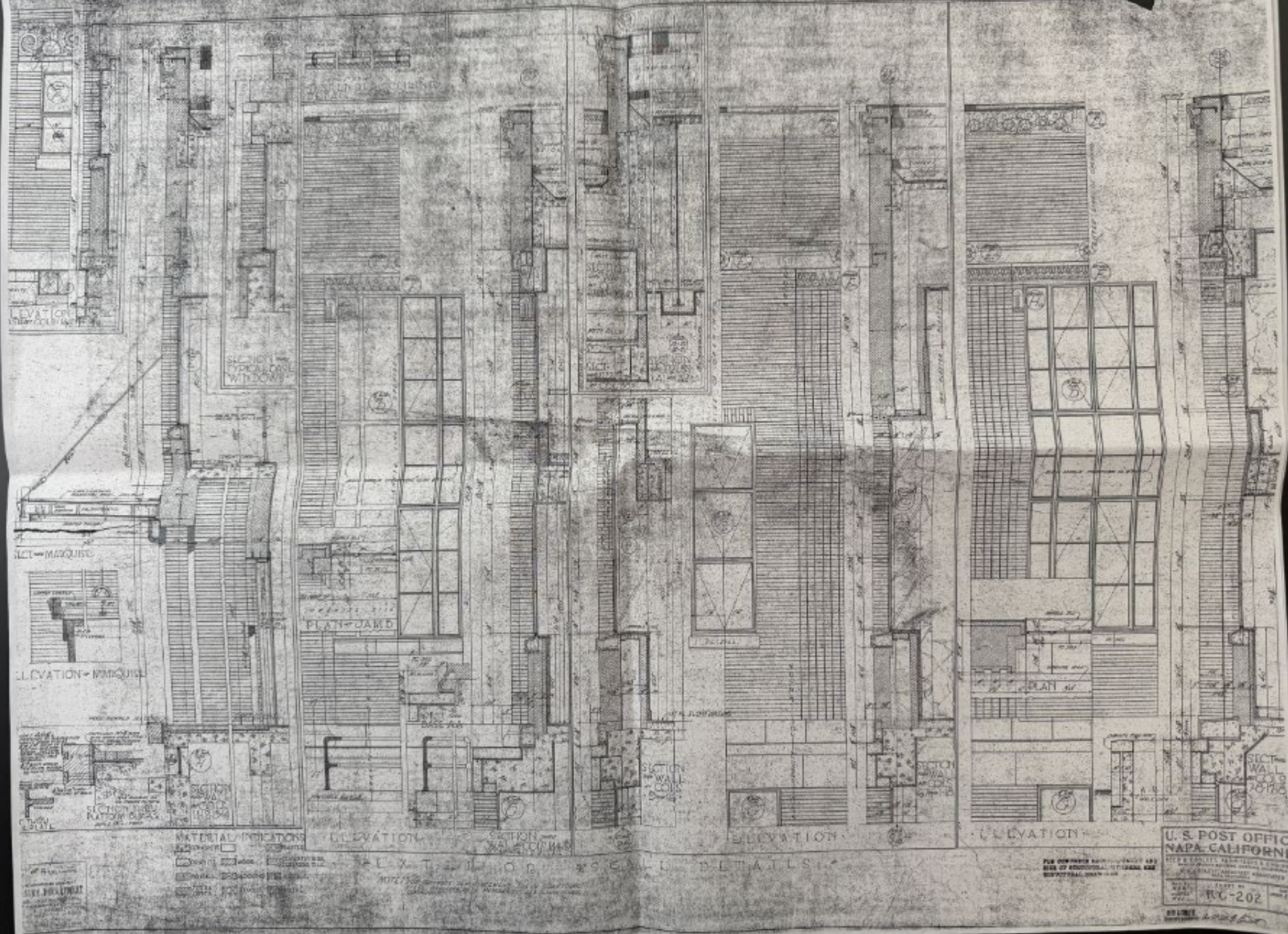

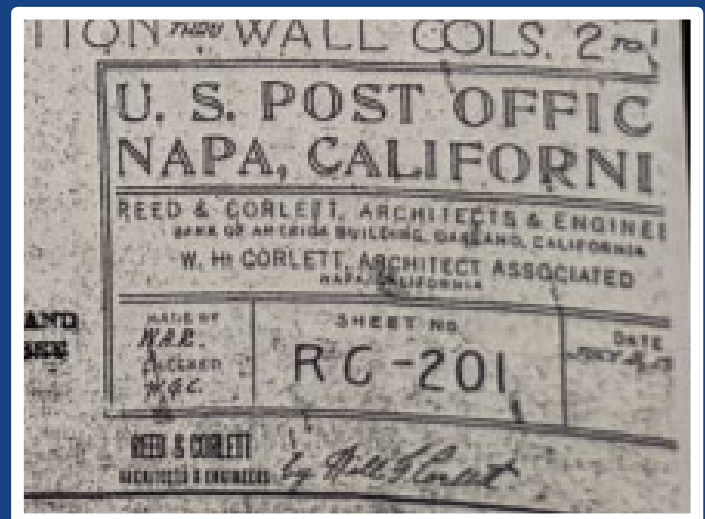
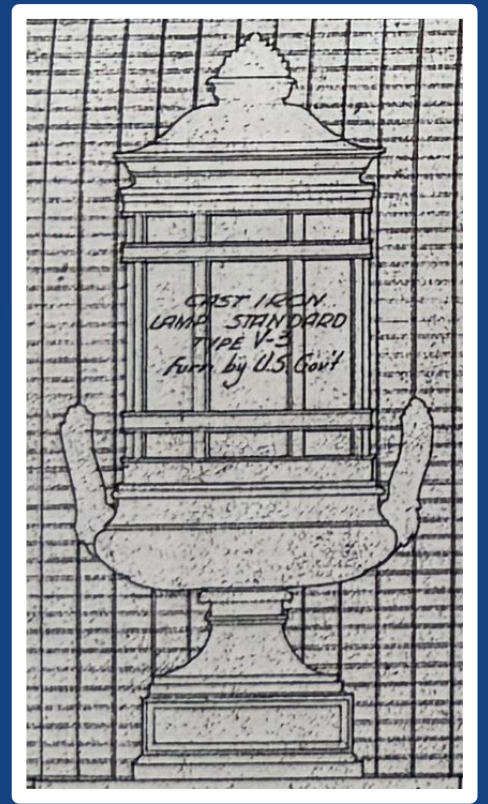
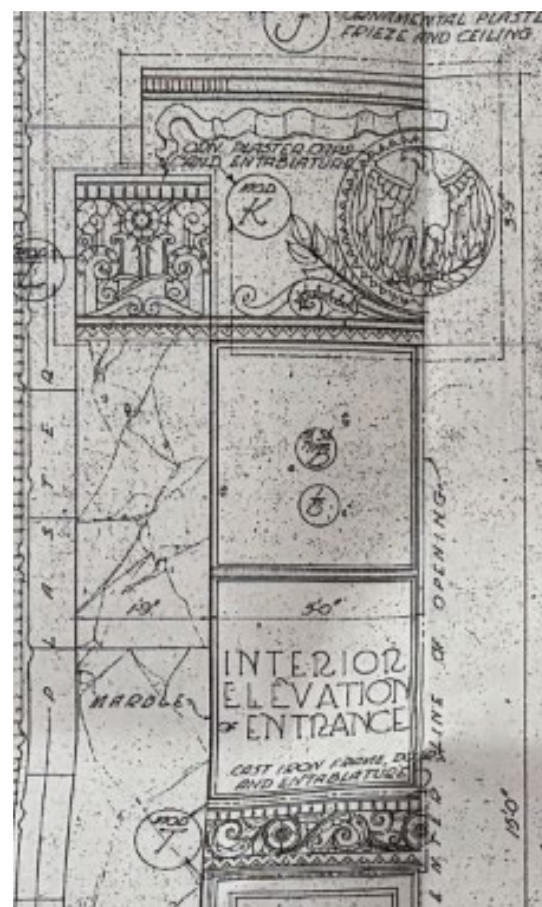
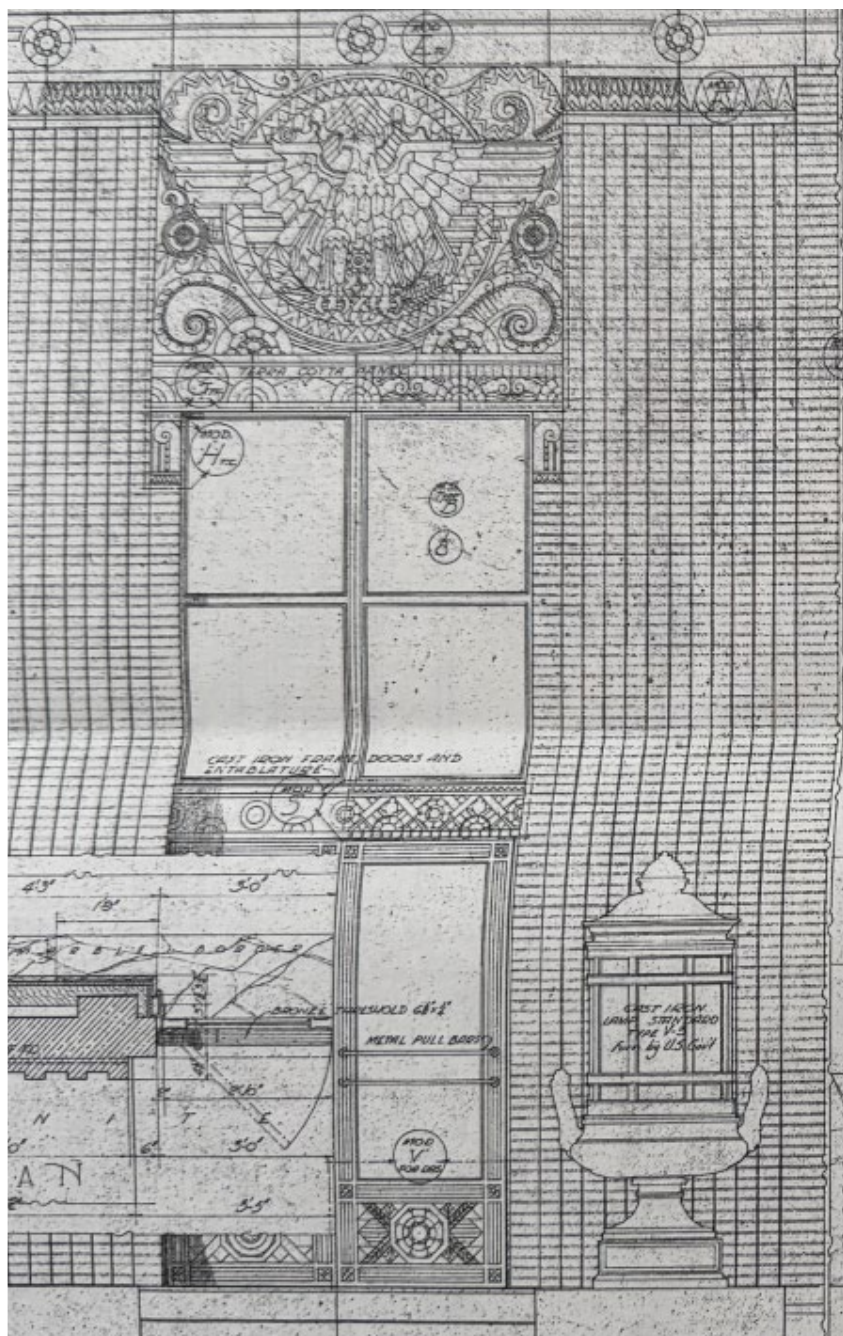
ELEVATION OF ENTRANCE - SECTION THROUGH ENTRANCE -

PROHIBITION FUND CUT MILLION

Committee Makes 10 Per Cent
Slash in \$11,000,000
Appropriation

WASHINGTON, April 8.—(UP)—
The Senate economy drive has pro-
hibited enactment today to trim
approximately \$1,000,000 from the
\$11,000,000 originally provided in the
Justice Department supply bill to
keep the country dry.

Senator McKellar, Democrat, Ten-
nessee, confirmed reports that the
enforcement appropriation had been
reduced by the Senate Appropriations
Committee. He said the re-
duction was approximately 10 per
cent. He predicted the Senate
would accept the cut in dry funds.

naires and members of the Veterans
of Foreign Wars presented to as-
sembled senators and congressmen
a petition said to contain more than
2,400,000 signatures demanding pay-
ment of the bonus.

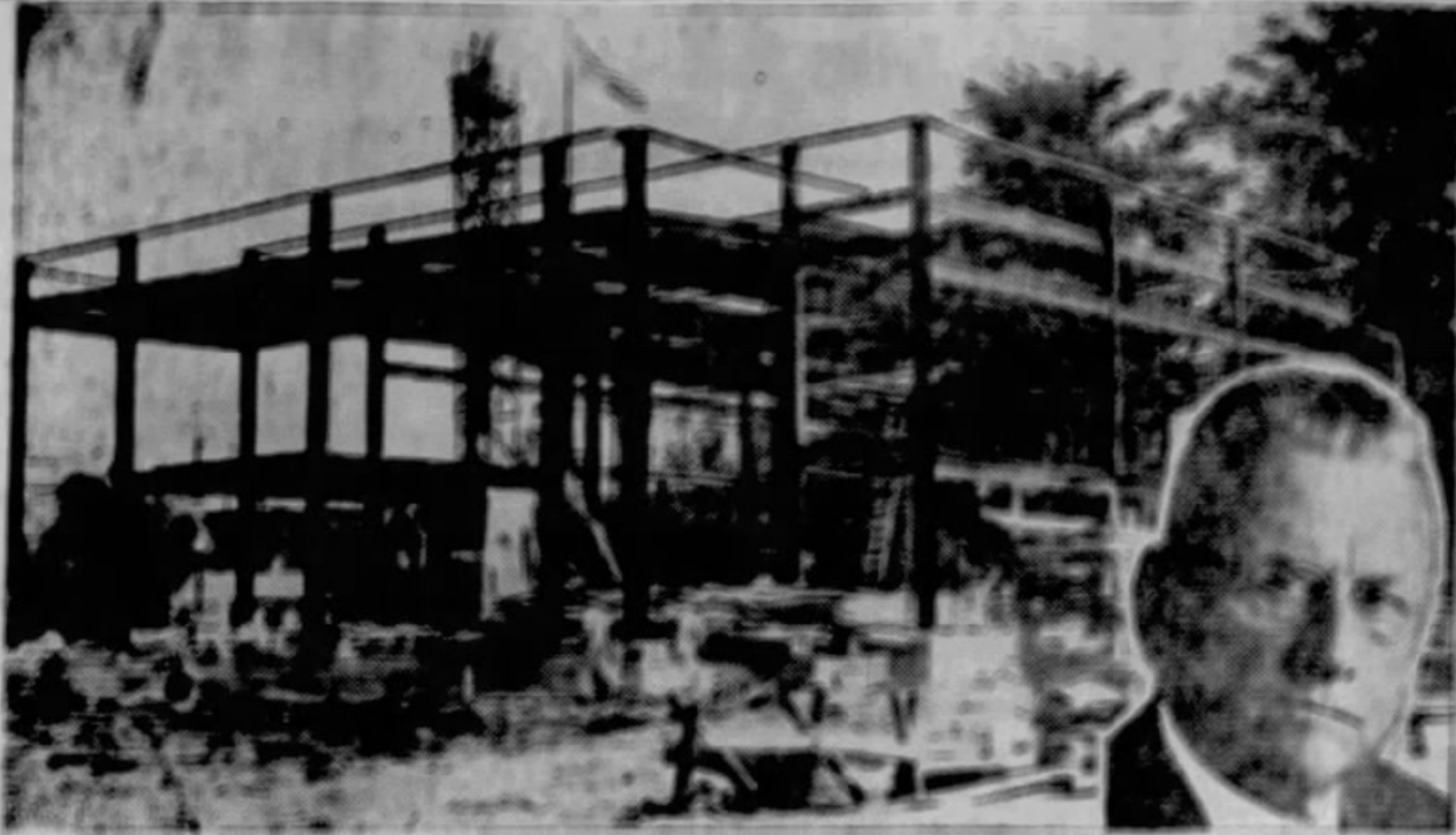

Framework Of Napa Post Office Rises

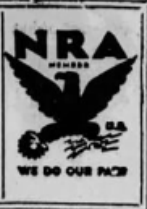

PROMINENT VISITORS TO BE HERE FOR BIG EVENT

Stately Lobby One of Outstanding Features of Napa's New Post Office

The citizens of Napa tomorrow afternoon will have their first real opportunity to view the interior of the magnificent new United States Post Office Building on Second street between Randolph and Franklin streets.

United States Treasury Department engineers headed by Edward W. Roberts and Mr. Jenner from the supervising architect's office at San Francisco made their final inspection of the structure yesterday afternoon and approved its accept-

the building. On this floor are five rooms for the use of Farm Advisor H. J. Baade and his staff; a civil service examination room which will also be used by the farm extension service as a lecture hall, and offices for the internal revenue deputy collector and postal inspector.

On this floor also are located the heating plant; store rooms; and an automatic sewage plant which from sumps forces the sewage into the city's street system.
